#### HISTORY

The Paso del Norte Health Foundation (Health Foundation) was established in 1995 from the sale of the not-for-profit Providence Memorial Hospital and is one of the largest private foundations on the United States/Mexico border.

The Health Foundation operates in a unique binational environment, which stretches across two countries and three states. The service area includes: Doña Ana, Luna and Otero Counties in New Mexico; El Paso and Hudspeth Counties in Texas; and the Municipality of Juárez, Chihuahua, México. Within the region's population of 2.3 million people, over 750,000 residents are under the age of 18.

#### MISSION STATEMENT

The Paso del Norte Health Foundation promotes health and prevents disease in the region through leadership in health education, research, and advocacy.

#### FUNDAMENTAL PREMISE

All people deserve good health; the Health Foundation's role is to lead, fund, promote, and leverage opportunities to ensure that all people in the Paso del Norte region achieve good health.

## PRIORITY AREAS

The Board of Directors identified five priority areas to focus the Health Foundation's work throughout the Paso del Norte region.

- Healthy Eating and Active Living (HEAL)
   To make healthy eating and active living an easy choice for youth and their families.
- Tobacco/Alcohol Control

  To eliminate tobacco use and reduce binge drinking, particularly among youth.
- Mental and Emotional Well-being

  To reduce the stigma associated with mental illness and explore structural changes in the region's behavioral health treatment system.
- Healthy Relationships
   To work with families, community organizations, and schools to increase the protective factors for youth.
- Health Leadership
   To develop regional health leaders and respond to community requests to provide leadership to emerging health-related initiatives.

Strong partnerships make health happen. This year was no exception. The Paso del Norte Health Foundation (Health Foundation) is privileged to work with many partners to improve the health of the people living in the Paso del Norte region. Here are a few of the projects made possible by our collaboration.

#### El Paso Behavioral Health Consortium

El Paso health care stakeholders and the Health Foundation collaborated to examine the El Paso community behavioral health system and identify what must take place for El Paso to achieve the finest system in the country.

#### **Enroll El Paso**

The Health Foundation worked with United Way of El Paso County to acquire federal dollars to establish a field office and hire navigators to support El Paso residents with the Affordable Care Act and enrollment into the Health Insurance Marketplace.

#### The Paso del Norte Institute for Healthy Living

The Health Foundation teamed with three of the largest educational institutions in El Paso to establish a center of excellence for healthy eating and active living (HEAL) across the region.

## Think.Change Initiative

With input from a number of organizations and a community coalition called the Brain Trust, the Health Foundation unveiled its new initiative, Think. Change. Think. Change is designed to reduce stigma associated with mental illness.

#### The Paso del Norte Foundation

In addition to forming new partnerships, the Health Foundation also established a new sister organization in 2013 – the Paso del Norte Foundation (PDN Foundation). The PDN Foundation is a public charity designed to advance the mission of the Health Foundation. We envision the PDN Foundation as a strategy, beyond our current investments, to ensure the work of the Health Foundation for future generations.

These accomplishments are not ours alone. Dozens of organizations and individuals continue to collaborate for the common cause. The Health Foundation's board and staff appreciate our partners and their commitment to the health of our communities. We look forward to seeing how 2013's success will build the health of the region into the future.

Recognizing the critical need to foster healthy lifestyles among the young people of the Paso del Norte region, three area universities partnered with the Health Foundation to lead community/regional efforts to improve healthy eating and active living. The University of Texas at El Paso, The University of Texas Health Science Center-Houston, School of Public Health, The Texas Tech University Health Science Center-Paul L. Foster School of Medicine, and the Health Foundation established a partnership to develop the Paso del Norte Institute for Healthy Living.

Funded with an initial \$2.2 million for five years, the purpose of the Institute is to advance healthy nutrition and physical activity and to reduce childhood obesity. Through the combined strengths of the four partners, the Institute will be the source of accurate and reliable health information and a leader in evidence-based interventions to increase proper nutrition and physical activity.


# THINK.CHANGE

Even though mental illness is a treatable medical condition, research shows that the stigma of mental illness creates significant barriers. Prejudice and discrimination are among the reasons that people with mental illness do not recover. Individuals with mental illness often have feelings of low self-esteem and isolation, limited access to housing and employment, and frequently do not seek treatment.

In 2013, the Health Foundation launched the Think. Change initiative - an effort to encourage residents in the region to discuss behavorial health and to seek out support needed for lasting recovery when needed. Some of the initiative's first actions address concerns that social service personnel, healthcare providers, and family members respond negatively when individuals with mental illness seek help and support. The Health Foundation funded six organizations to expand evidence-based, health education programs, including:

- Is it Difficult Being a Woman? Guide on Depression
- Mental Health First Aid
- National Alliance on Mental Illness

  - Family-to-Family

Robert E. Skov Skov Farms The Health Foundation was established to be a permanent resource to support health promotion and disease prevention. Until 2013, the sustainability of the Health Foundation was dependent upon investments. As 2008 demonstrated, the investment marketplace can be turbulent.

In order to ensure the permanent sustainability of its work, the Health Foundation established a new public charity called the Paso del Norte Foundation (PDN Foundation) in 2013. The mission of the PDN Foundation is to advance the mission of the Health Foundation and to support health-related priorities, including: economic development, education, and quality of life.

**Public charities** receive contributions from a broad range of donors in support of their charitable purpose; and they offer tax benefits to donors who make investments to further the charitable purpose. They can receive contributions, make grants and manage programs.

**Private foundations**, like the Health Foundation, are typically funded by a single source (an individual, family or business); they derive their income from investments; and they make grants to others as their main activity. Laws governing private foundations also require them to grant five percent of their assets to support charitable purposes each year.

The PDN Foundation and the Health Foundation will complement each other to improve the region's health.


